HEDGES+ PATHWAY MAINTENANCE.

Do you need help with cutting your hedge or clearing a walkway at the rear of your property? If you are elderly, have special needs or disabilities and no help from family AND HAVE NOT BEEN GIVEN ASSISTANCE BEFORE from the Frankley Parish Council/Frankley Neighbourhood Forum then help is available.

The service is done on a one-off basis and is not a repeat house gardening service. The work is carried out on a Saturday morning by an experienced team who have been engaged in Frankley on this type of work for over 2 years. Please leave your details at the Parish Council Office in Arden Road shops or phone the Parish Council on 0121 457 9410 and you will be contacted to arrange a visit to view the work.

If you do need assistance on a regular basis Age Concern Birmingham has a First Call Tradesperson for hedges and gardens and the phone number is 0121 262 3020.

If there are any Public paths and walkways that are overgrown then please report them to Birmingham City Council on 0121 464 7297. Please also report them to Parish Council Office so we can endeavour to cut these as well.

A lot of the walkways and paths are regularly litter picked by volunteers ,some of them belonging to The Frankley Street Champions. I would like to thank all these volunteers for their splendid work.

Please support these dedicated members of our community and don't drop your litter on the floor; put it in a bin or take it home. Thank you

ANNUAL PARISH REPORT OF THE CHAIRPERSON

19TH MAY 2014

ACKOWLEGEMENT OF THE WORK UNDERTAKEN BY GROUPS AND INDIVIDUALS THAT BENEFIT THE FRANKLEY COMMUNITY.

Firstly, I wish to commence my 2014 Annual Report by thanking all my Council Member Colleagues for the time and dedication they have put into serving on the New Frankley in Birmingham Parish Council, a service for which no payment is received.

Over the last year the Council has seen the results of the reduction in a number of City Council Services taking effect within the community. The two dedicated Beat Sweepers who had been employed by the City Council on Frankley for several years have been withdrawn. The Council has also seen the effect of the withdrawal of the free garden waste collection service resulting in green waste bags left across the area uncollected for several weeks. There has also been a reduction in the Library opening hours which prompted a very large number of residents to attend a Public Meeting in February and raise concerns regarding the future of this service.

However, a marvellous positive result has been observed with the increasing number of local residents, across the Parish from Charnwood Close to Romany Road, who have joined the Frankley Street Champions to assist in tackling the litter problem. As members of the community, a number of your Parish Councillors have facilitated these collections, with Bruce Pitt, Ian Bruckshaw, Linda Coates and Sam Goodwin being lead participants.

Last year it is estimated more than 500 sacks of litter were cleared. As Chairperson of the Council, I wish to personally thank all those who have contributed to this remarkable effort which has received praise from City Council Members and envy from other Neighbourhoods across the City.

Frankley Neighbourhood Forum Management Committee have taken on board a project that has resulted in 100 composter units being supplied, at a reduced price, to residents to assist with the garden waste problem.

In addition I wish to highlight the outstanding contribution and endeavour to social life in the Frankley Community which has been made by Members of the Frankley Carnival Committee. Linda Coates, Ian Bruckshaw and Bruce Pitt together with their team have arranged the staging of a number of Community events which have proved a great success. Not only did they organise the Annual Carnival in September 2013 but they also have run other successful events for all ages. These have included a Halloween Party and East Egg Hunt for young people and also a "Forties Event" for the Members of the Reaside Community Centre, Senior Citizens Lunch Club. Their work has been acknowledged in the Constituency with Linda Coates receiving a special award from the Constituency Housing Liaison Board.

The Frankley Neighbourhood Forum, which has existed for 17 years, continues to serve the community in many ways one of which is the distribution of the quarterly community newsletter, the printing of which is funded by a grant from the Council, to every household. In addition I wish to again praise the work of Ian Bruckshaw who, in his position on the Frankley Neighbourhood Forum, has organised hedge cutting work for elderly and disabled residents. He continues to pursue improvements to the condition of the walkways across the Parish which have been neglected and seen as a place for illegal fly-tipping. Ian is leading a project to attempt to tackle these areas over the next year and is in contact with the City Officers to badger them to take on board their responsibilities for keeping these areas properly maintained. The Forum is also employing a Specialist Contractor to assist the project. A grant contribution of £7,790 was approved by the Parish Council at its April 2014 meeting to support this necessary work.

The Council has recently seen the introduction of new orders regarding dog control under the Clean Neighbourhoods and Environmental Act 2005. One of the orders relates to fouling of land by dogs which the public have access and which could result in a Fixed Penalty notice or Maximum Fine of £1000 for owners who allow their dogs to foul public land. There is no excuse as the Parish Council has, for a number of years, provided free "Poop Scoops" which have been very popular amongst the responsible dog owners in the Parish and which can be placed in litter bins for removal. Unfortunately a number of irresponsible owners continue to allow their dogs to foul in public places and have been seen throwing the scoops onto verges and bushes and run the risk of a penalty fine being issued.

Fly-tipping also unfortunately continues across the area with the illegal dumping of various items, many of which could have been removed free of charge through the Neighbourhood Caretaking Service, which is jointly funded by your Parish Council.

If residents have an item that requires assistance in moving then contact the Parish Council Office for help, however this no longer includes bricks and building debris due to weight restrictions.

The Neighbourhood Caretakers employed by the Northfield District in association with the Parish Council provide a service well above and beyond what their duties require.

FRANKLEY FLOOD PROTECTION

Although the last winter was one of the wettest on record and caused devastation in other parts of the Country thankfully this has not severely affected Frankley.

A lot of this can be attributed to the work of the Street Champions and other volunteers who have pursued the maintenance of river banks in the area. In addition special funding was obtained for training to be provided for the group. Work has also recently been started to tackle a long standing drainage problem in Princess Diana Walk which has been urged by the work of local residents and the Street Champions. However residents are again requested to assist in ensuring their family members do not throw rubbish into the streams that run through our neighbourhood. If you observe any items dumped in the streams again let us know so that clearance can be arranged. Keep an eye on the condition of the drains throughout your locality and if you observe a blockage please report it to the Council.

Remembrance:

Eric Carter will not be in attendance at this year's Annual Meeting as he will be in France, a place where 70 years ago as a 19 year old Marine when serving in the British Armed Forces was part of the "D Day" Normandy landings. At 89 he still continues to serve the public through the Parish Council with enormous energy and I wish to make my personal appreciation known for the work he undertakes and the dedication he has given in serving our community.

History of Frankley

Gannow Green Gannou: first record 1330

Gannow Green lies at the west end of Frankley. The green itself, an agriculture feature, probably dates from the Middle Ages when the term usually referred to common land over which local people had certain rights. Chief of these was that of grazing their livestock. Gannow may derive from two Old English words: **gamen** and **ho:** the first element meaning 'to game' or 'to play': the second, a topographical word meaning 'a ridge' [of land] that sticks out. The implication is of a 'recreation area on a hill'. What the origin of this may have been remains open to conjecture, although it suggest a site perhaps performing the function of a village green.

Little is known of the early history of the manor of Gannow. It is first found in the records in 1330 when Hugh de Mortimer obtained a grant of free warren here. This was in effect a licence bought by a manorial lord from the Crown to hunt on his own land small game, such as badger, fox, hare, otter, rabbit, squirrel, partridge and pheasant. This rather suggests a resident or at least a semi-resident lord. In 1407 the manor of Gannow was held by Richard and Elizabeth Ruyhale from the Earl of Warwick and then passed through various families including the Boleyns. Thomas, Earl of Ormond c1477-1539, the father of Anne Boleyn was lord of the manor. In the 19th century Gannow manor passed with that of Cofton Hackett to the Earl of Plymouth.

In 1961, ahead of building the development, Gannow Green Moat was excavated by Birmingham Archaeological Society's junior fieldwork group directed by B K Roberts. It was found that the site had been occupied from the 13th century to the 15th century. On the south side was found a massive stone curtain wall which had been built in the first half of the 14th century, and a fine tiled hearth of c1400. Evidence was also uncovered of buildings with tiled roofs.

The wooded moated site at the west end of Devon Road, now a Scheduled Ancient Monument, is the location of the medieval manor house. Now dry and grassed, the moat was dug to surround a timber-framed building of some size and prestige. The moat was edged with a sandstone wall and must have been an expensive venture, more a display of status than a defence, and only undertaken by people of some wealth.

Two fishponds east of the moat, around Devon Road/Kent Road, and around Lismore Close must have provided an important addition to the medieval diet; these too were a symbol. Although the sites are now covered by housing, part of the dam of one of the ponds can still be seen alongside Mull Close. The dam was originally built across the River Rea, though that river has subsequently diverted to its present course

Gannow windmill is no longer there but features on the 1st Edition Ordnance Survey map of 1834. Situated on the site north of New Inns Lane in the Ormond Road area, it may have had a relationship with Frogmill on the River Rea nearby. From the 18th century and earlier, when watermills were turned over to the metal industries, a windmill was often built to continued grinding corn.

The Quality of the Water in our Rivers

BALAAMS WOOD- FRANKLEY/BOURLAY BROOK FIN SURVEY 24.4.14 summary [FIN Freshwater Invertebrate Network]

The Friends of Balaams Wood FIN group have set up a new survey site on the Frankley/ Bourlay Brook, a little tributary of the River Rea just off Ormond Road. It flows along the edge of Gannow Green Moat-the site of a medieval homestead and now an atmospheric wooded and swampy area bursting with choice woodland plants including the town hall clock plant ADOXA MOSCHATELLINA.

Too shallow to survey with the big net, the creatures were collected by turning over stones and peering into the water. Water crickets skated around on the surface and a good variety of creatures were found beneath the water including lots of shrimps. A giant leech was admired by some and Olive mayfly, cased caddis and a few stonefly larvae were found, the latter being quite intolerant of polluted water. Interestingly the Bladder Snail was also found – this species is one of the most **tolerant** of pollution. Under the larger stones were little piles of stones stuck on in a sloppy matrix of netting a sure sign of caseless caddis larvae which build nests in a fixed location rather than carrying their cases around with them.

Where Do Names on Frankley Come From?

As most of you will know, the Lickey Banker pub is named after the locomotive that helped trains up the Lickey Incline the steepest main line bank in Great Briton [it is 1 in 37.7] Wikipedia shows just one locomotive but I was told recently that there was more than one. The engine shown by wiki was known a Big Emma and then Big Bertha and was a 0-10-0, an unusual wheel arrangement but understandable in view of the task, no bogey wheels. Does anyone know more?
